

SSCM Reels Teen Experiences (Interviews) WIP - Ipsos Copy

Background

- Reels featuring kids/tweens, and teens (i.e., 0-15) dancing and posing are pervasive, and often show up on people's Reels experience, even in cold starts. While much of this content is benign (they may be uninteresting to users, but not necessarily harmful), some may include risky elements (i.e., partial nudity, suggestive dance moves that are borderline CEI) that make both viewers uncomfortable and the subjects at risk.
- (Note: In this document, we use the term "sexually suggestive content featuring minors" (SSCM), which covers our recommendation quality guidelines section 2.1 & 2.4: "Nudity or Exploitation of Minors")
- Sexually suggestive content featuring minors (SSCM) (labeled prevalence) is 2-3x more prevalent on Reels home than on Explore.
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- Our detection methods are great at catching nude babies and young girls dancing, but the most reported SSCM features minors posing and dancing.
- SSCM is the most severe (creation & consumption) in Brazil and Argentina. Looking at media fiddler, US SSCM consists of a mix of naked babies and young girls dancing, whereas Brazil SSCM are mostly tweens dancing.
- There are multiple kinds of child safety content issues at play, all of which have different potential solutions. More work is needed to better understand what proportion of all SSCM these three distinct issues account for. They're presented here, in order of severity.
- "True" exploitation of minors (i.e., suggestive dancing/positioning): We need to better detect and filter content depicting minors in sexually suggestive ways on Reels, as the reporting vs. prevalence data suggests that we're permitting many to "slip through the cracks". Improving our detection of minors, as well as getting ahead of problematic trends (i.e., upcoming dance trends that may put children at risk) may help us improve.
- Benign but still risky content featuring minors: Children dancing/posing unto itself is not problematic, but it becomes an issue if bad actors see it. New approaches to protect children and teens (i.e., preventing visibility between known IIC adults and minors on other surfaces like Explore) should be ported to Reels as soon as possible. We also know that tolerance for this content varies by country and is not preferred for many non-teen users, who tell us regularly that they'd rather not see content like this. More effective / child content personalization (SFPLT) or creating "teen-centered" ranking approaches for teens may help solve this problem.

- (if they produce on both TT and Reels)
 - have you experienced risk/harm in both TT and Reels?
 - are they similar kinds of risk/harm, or different? if so, in what way?
 - how do you respond in TT vs. Reels?
- Supports:
 - What they wish IG would do
 - Who do you go to for help?
 - How involved are parents?

Consuming SSCM - ASK IF HAVE TIME

- Do you watch other people's reels like yours? Do you see other similar people interacting with those?
- How much do other teens you know produce this content?
- How often do you see other content - unconnected? Connected?
- Do you experience any discomfort when you see other SSCM? (bullying comments, gender hate speech, social comparison, etc.)
